She was sitting at a well drawing water by herself during the heat of day when others stayed inside. The conversation included a thousand "ish" year-old argument over the location of the proper place of worship. To this, Jesus responded,

"Woman, believe me, a time is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. Yet a time is coming and has now come when the true worshipers will worship the Father in the Spirit and in truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks. God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in the Spirit and in truth."

I have often pondered the multiple meanings behind these words. I feel certain that arguing about how and where God can be worshipped is not the best way for God's people to be utilizing their time and energy. We are losing generations of people who are seeking meaning and purpose for their life and Christ gave us the solution. Our challenge is for us to create ways to reveal God in spirit and truth without the use of buildings. How do we do that? I'll share more thoughts on this topic next week.

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
